

Review of Loneliness Research Published within 2024-2025: A Bibliometric Analysis and its Implications in India

Abstract

This study utilizes Bibliometric analysis, extracted from the Scopus database and employs VOSviewer, to explore the global landscape of recent loneliness research from 2024 to 2025. Extracting 396 publications through keyword searches "Loneliness" in title and abstract, the analysis reveals a significant concentration of research output from Western nations, including the USA, UK, and Canada, alongside notable contributions from China and Australia. This highlights the perceived public health importance of loneliness in these regions. However, absence of India among the top 11 publishing countries is observed, despite its vast and diverse population. This absence suggests a potential research gap in addressing loneliness within the Indian context. The co-occurrence of keywords elucidates dominant thematic areas, with clusters emphasizing the mental health implications of loneliness, particularly among vulnerable groups like older adults. The pandemic's impact on adolescent mental health is also prominently featured, with clusters like "adolescents," "Covid-19," and "mental health." These global research trends raise critical questions about their applicability and scope for research in India.

The study highlights the necessity to examine the unique challenges faced by India's population with regard to loneliness, considering factors like evolving family structures, work life imbalance and limited social support. Similarly, the impact of Covid-19 on the mental health of the population India must be understood within the context of existing social inequalities and resource limitations. The findings propose for a deeper investigation into the dimensions of loneliness with special reference to India.

1. Introduction and background

Humans instinctively crave social connection, a point emphasized by Rokach (2019). Many key thinkers have explored this essential need. Maslow (1968) placed the desire to belong as a crucial motivator, just below personal achievement, in his well-known model. Bowlby (1969) argued that early relationships are the cornerstone of healthy development. Erikson (1968) also highlighted how relationships shape who we are and how we interact with society. From a survival perspective, being part of a group offers vital protection (Baumeister

& Leary, 1995; Cacioppo & Cacioppo, 2018). When people lack these connections, they often feel isolated.

Definition of loneliness was provided long back by Sullivan (1953) as "*Loneliness is the exceedingly unpleasant and driving experience connected with the inadequate discharge of the need for human intimacy, for interpersonal relationship.*" Other researchers like Weiss, (1973) stated that the loneliness is not the result of just physical isolation. Rather, it arises from the absence of particular, necessary relationships or social connections, desired by individuals. One of the most popular definitions of loneliness is provided by (Perlman & Peplau, 1981) as the '*uncomfortable feeling of missing important social connections, either in number or quality*'. Loneliness is more than just being physically by oneself; it's a profound emotional state. It's marked by feelings of emptiness, isolation, and a sense of being unvalued. Those who are lonely often yearn for human connection, but their emotional state creates barriers to forming those connections. Many experts agree that loneliness is primarily about the feeling of isolation, even within a social context. Researchers have distinguished loneliness with other related constructs like aloneness. While loneliness is a state of involuntary solitude, a feeling of being isolated against one's wills, aloneness implies a deliberate choice. It signifies a desire to be by oneself, a self-selected state of being (Bekhet & Zauszniewski, 2008). Loneliness stems from a perceived of meaningful relationships and can be considered as an emotion of distress. A person with the feeling of loneliness do not get the level of intimacy desired from the social connections. It's the individual's evaluation of their social isolation and communication deficits that defines their loneliness (Gierveld, 1998).

1.1 Loneliness in workplace

Loneliness isn't a matter, but workplace loneliness has remained an unclear an overlooked area both in theory and practice. People contribute as much time, if not more, at their workplace than in other activities of the day and that is why research on loneliness in the workplace is crucial. In like manner, social aspects of workplace have a strong impact on employee mental aspects. Organization's structural and technological changes have made it difficult for employees to build close and valued relationships. The negative effects of workplace loneliness are felt when the need for social interactions is not satisfied. Loneliness is a human state that surges when people feel their social involvements lack either quality or number (Russell, Peplau, & Cutrona, 1980). The fulfillment of interpersonal needs such as care, love, acceptance and a sense of belongingness is crucial for social well-being (Maslow, 1943). Csikszentmihalyi (1990) stated that human beings are biologically designed to find other human beings, which for us are the most important object in the world. The origin of workplace loneliness research stems from the work of Wright, Brunt and Strongman (2006) where workplace loneliness is defines as "*a reflection of the negativities in the quality of social interactions and individual relations*". Wright et al. (2006) identified workplace loneliness with regard to two aspects: *emotional deprivation* (qualitative aspect) and *social companionship* (quantitative aspects). Employees subjected to extended periods of workplace loneliness might show heightened levels of avoidance and neglect. The severity of these

impacts exhibits that the repercussions of such workplace loneliness are a crucial subject for future research (Lam & Lau, 2012).

Negative consequences of loneliness on employee productivity and overall well-being were highlighted by Murthy (2017). Moreover the emerging threat of loneliness in both personal and professional spheres was highlighted by Murthy, (2020). Organizational conducts during COVID-10 such as; social distancing, tele-commuting, and virtual meetings lessened human interactions, increasing feelings of social isolation and the absence of self-disclosure among employees. Given the extensive and pervasive nature of loneliness and the limitedness of research on workplace loneliness, there has been an ongoing need for more exploration in this untapped area (Ghadi, 2017; Mohapatra, Madan, & Srivastava, 2020). This brings out the significance of exploring the issue of workplace loneliness. Study on workplace loneliness remains minimal, offering limited theoretical and empirical observations. It is still in its embryonic stages, with substantial gaps in understanding its predictors, effects, and surrounding parameters (Anand & Mishra, 2021; Ozcelik & Barsade, 2018; Wright & Silard, 2020).

1.2 Negative consequences of the feeling of loneliness

Workplace loneliness reduced the enthusiasm required for creative thinking and generating new concepts. (Zhu et al., 2024) A survey was conducted on 249 employee-colleague dyads from China which evaluated the link between workplace loneliness and unethical pro-organizational behavior (UPB). The findings showed that workplace loneliness increases the likelihood of UPB. Thwarting of employees' relatedness needs and their diminished sense of belonging act as the mediators in this relationship.(O'Hare et al., 2024) conducted a survey on 477 healthcare workers of UK who worked remotely at COVID-19 period. The study was conducted to find the association between workplace loneliness, workplace isolation, perceived social support and overall well being using multiple regression models. As the loneliness scores increased, the well being scores decreased. People who worked more than 31 hours a week felt lonelier. A study done on 6310 participants of the South Eastern United States (healthcare workers) during COVID period (2020-22) showed that loneliness leads to perceived stress in the workplace but those who were in the clinical roles were more affected by stress than administrative roles (Meseet et al., 2024). (Heo et al., 2024) studies 1770 people from Korea aged 30-53 and found that higher levels of loneliness were associated with suicidal intentions of the individuals. Individuals who were experiencing higher loneliness were more likely to be single, have lesser household income, poor physical well-being. They also underwent quarantine during the COVID-19 period and showed extreme feelings of anger, anxiety, and depression.

1.3 Objective of the study

The study aims to review the recent literature on loneliness published between the years 2024-25 in Scopus database using Bibliometric analysis and to understand the contributions and implications with regard to India.

2. Bibliometric analysis

Quantitative methods applied to bibliographic data, like co-citation and co-word analyses, constitute bibliometric methodology (Broadus, 1987). This approach enables researchers to identify and visually represent the primary contributors—authors, nations, and institutions—to a particular body of literature (Xu et al., 2018). In management research, bibliometric analysis is commonly employed:

- a. To clarify the conceptual frameworks that underpins a specific research area (Caviggioli & Ughetto, 2019).
- b. To establish a comprehensive understanding of a research domain's scope and to suggest potential directions for future inquiry, minimizing individual researcher bias (Fahimnia et al., 2015; Khanra et al., 2020).

3. Methodology

The study is based on secondary data. Pertinent resources for this study were retrieved from the Scopus database and VOSviewer has been used for bibliometric analysis. Scopus database has been used to collect articles on loneliness published between 2024 and 2025. The keyword "*Loneliness*" in the title and abstract search without restrictions has been used to extract papers. A total of 396 publications (articles and review papers) were extracted.

4. Results

Table 1 shows top 11 countries with in terms of publication (minimum 10 citations). Most productive countries were USA (n = 99), China (n=70), United Kingdom (n=49), Canada (n=31) Australia (n=30), Spain (n=27) and Netherland (n=24).

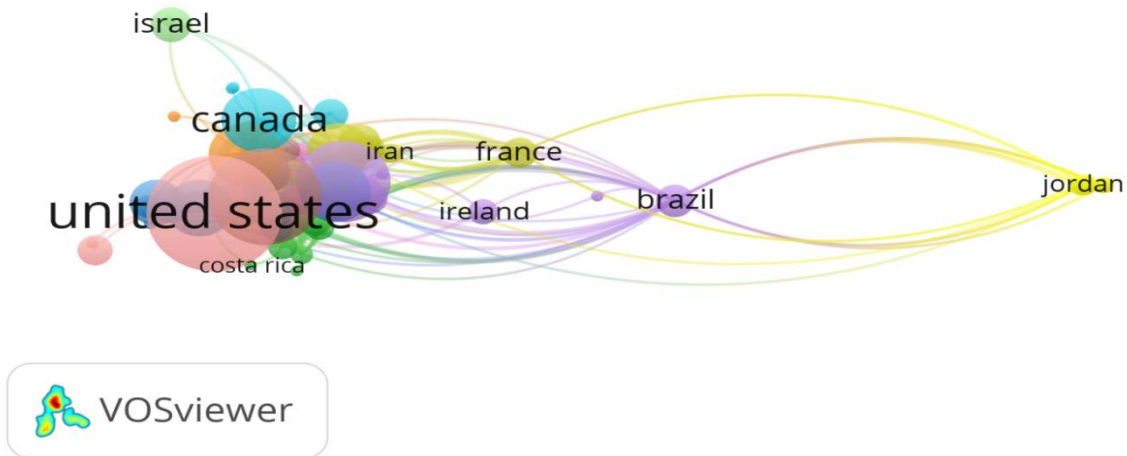

Figure 1: Network over lay of co-authorship map of countries

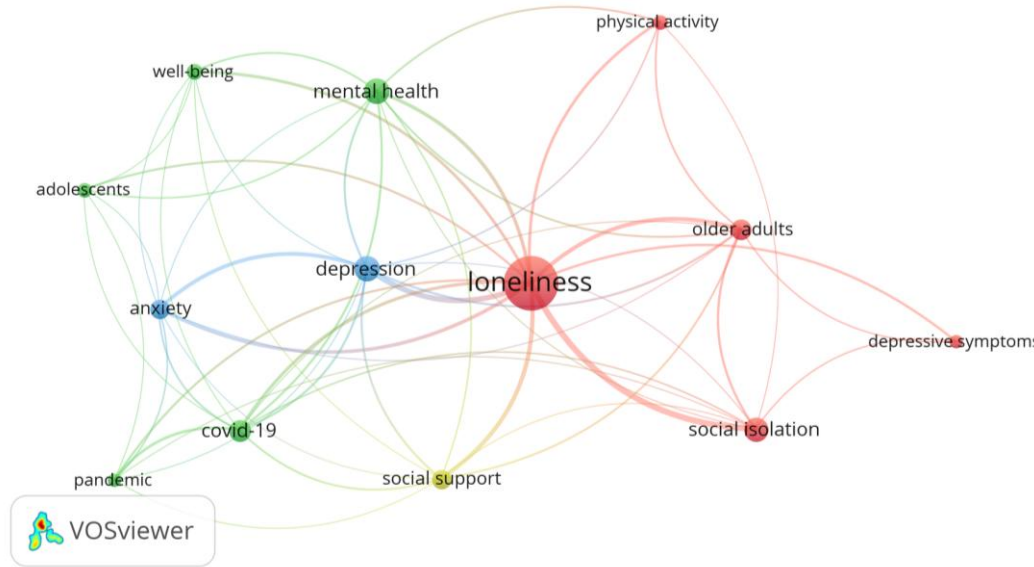


Author keywords

Co-occurrence of author keywords with a minimum of ten occurrences is shown in Figure 2. A total of 13 words were found, which could be bifurcated under 4 clusters; 1) Loneliness,

depressive symptoms, older adults, physical activity, social isolation; 2) adolescents, Covid-19, mental health, pandemic, well being; 3) anxiety, depression; 4) social support.

5. Discussions

The global landscape of loneliness research, as evidenced by the top publishing countries, reveals a strong concentration in Western nations like the USA, UK, and Canada, as well as significant contributions from China and Australia. This highlights the perceived importance of loneliness as a public health issue in these regions. However, the absence of India among the top 11 publishing countries, despite its large and diverse population, raises questions. This could indicate a potential gap in research focus or a difference in how loneliness is conceptualized and addressed within the Indian context. The current analysis reveals a notable absence of India among the leading countries contributing to loneliness research. This suggests that the phenomenon of loneliness, despite its potential prevalence and impact within India's vast and diverse population, has received comparatively limited scholarly attention.

"The co-occurrence of keywords provides valuable insights into the thematic areas dominating loneliness research. The clustering of 'loneliness' with 'depressive symptoms,' 'older adults,' and 'social isolation' suggests a strong focus on the mental health implications of loneliness, particularly among vulnerable populations. The 'adolescents,' 'Covid-19,' and 'mental health' cluster reflects the pandemic's significant impact on youth well-being. The relevance of these clusters in India warrants further examination. For instance, the emphasis on 'older adults' may need to consider the unique challenges faced by India's aging population, such as changing family structures and limited access to social support. Similarly, the impact of Covid-19 on adolescent mental health in India might be compounded by existing social inequalities and limited mental health resources. Understanding the specific

manifestations of these themes within the Indian socio-cultural context is crucial for developing targeted interventions and policies.

6. Conclusion

A notable absence of India despite its significant population has been reflected in the Bibliometric analysis of 396 Scopus-indexed papers on loneliness from 2024-25. The prominent keywords used in those papers, such as 'depressive symptoms,' 'older adults,' 'social isolation,' 'adolescents,' 'Covid-19,' and 'mental health' highlights the prevailing focus on the mental health implications of loneliness, particularly among old age populations. However, the applicability and relevance of these themes within the unique socio-cultural context of India remain largely unexplored. This gap brings the necessity for further research to understand the underlying dimensions of loneliness in India, considering factors like changing family structures, work life imbalance, social inequalities, and lack of awareness on mental health, to develop targeted interventions and policies that address the nation's specific needs.

7. Limitations

This study acknowledges several limitations. Firstly, the analysis is based on publications extracted solely from Scopus database, excluding potential relevant publications indexed in Google Scholar and Web of Science. Secondly, the search strategy exclusively utilized the term "loneliness," potentially overlooking studies addressing related concepts like major determinants and consequences. Thirdly, the analysis was restricted to publications from the years 2024-2025, limiting the scope of the findings to a narrow temporal window.

8. Scope for future research

The factors influencing publication impact and citation counts are multifaceted and extend beyond the parameters considered in this study, particularly focusing on India. Future research should consider incorporating a broader range of databases, exploring alternative search terms, and extending the temporal scope to provide a more comprehensive understanding of the field.
