Despite its richness, Assamese folk literature faces unprecedented challenges in the twenty-first century. Modern lifestyles, urban migration, globalization, and the dominance of digital entertainment have reduced opportunities for oral storytelling and community performances. As elderly tradition bearers gradually disappear, many valuable traditions risk being permanently lost. Therefore, preserving and revitalizing Assamese folk literature has become an essential aspect of sustainable cultural development.

The present study attempts to examine Assamese folk literature from a critical perspective by exploring its nature, historical evolution, major forms, and cultural relevance. It also investigates the challenges confronting folk traditions and proposes sustainable strategies for their preservation and promotion in contemporary society.

It reflects the emotional, spiritual, economic, and ecological experiences of various indigenous communities inhabiting the Brahmaputra and Barak valleys. Through songs, stories, proverbs, myths, legends, riddles, and dramatic performances, Assamese folk literature preserves traditional knowledge relating to agriculture, festivals, religious practices, family life, environmental conservation, and social ethics.

One of the distinctive characteristics of Assamese folk literature is its close association with everyday life. Folk expressions emerge naturally from farming activities, seasonal celebrations, marriage ceremonies, religious rituals, and communal gatherings. Consequently, they function not only as literary compositions but also as instruments of education, entertainment, moral instruction, and social integration. Their continued relevance demonstrates the resilience of oral traditions despite rapid socio-economic transformation.

Historical Development

The history of Assamese folk literature extends far beyond the emergence of written Assamese literature. Long before the development of manuscripts and printed texts, knowledge and cultural traditions were transmitted orally within families and communities. Early inhabitants of Assam depended on storytelling, songs, ritual chants, and communal performances to preserve their collective experiences and cultural identity.

The multicultural composition of Assam significantly enriched the evolution of its folk traditions. Communities such as the Assamese, Bodo, Mising, Karbi, Rabha, Tiwa, Dimas, Deori, Sonowal Kachari, and many others contributed distinctive narratives, songs, myths, and ritual performances. Continuous interaction among these communities facilitated cultural exchange, resulting in a rich and diversified folk heritage.

Agriculture played a decisive role in shaping Assamese folk literature. Seasonal cultivation, harvest celebrations, and dependence on nature inspired numerous folk songs and rituals expressing gratitude, hope, fertility, and harmony with the environment. Rivers, forests, birds, animals, and changing seasons became recurring symbols within oral traditions.

A significant transformation occurred during the Neo-Vaishnavite movement initiated by Srimanta Sankardeva in the fifteenth century. Although his literary works belong primarily to written literature, the movement profoundly influenced Assamese folk culture by promoting devotional music, dramatic performances, and community participation. Traditional folk performances gradually incorporated Vaishnavite themes while preserving indigenous cultural elements.

Throughout the colonial and post-colonial periods, Assamese folk literature continued to evolve through interaction with modern education, print culture, and changing social conditions. Despite these transformations, oral traditions have retained their cultural vitality and continue to represent an indispensable component of Assam's intangible cultural heritage.

Major Forms

Assamese folk literature comprises a wide range of oral traditions that collectively represent

the cultural diversity of the region. Each form possesses distinct literary characteristics while contributing to the preservation of collective memory and indigenous knowledge.

Folk Songs

Folk songs constitute the most vibrant component of Assamese oral literature. They express human emotions, agricultural experiences, religious devotion, romantic feelings, and communal celebrations. Sung during festivals, rituals, and social ceremonies, these songs strengthen social relationships and reinforce cultural identity.

Among these traditions, Bihu songs remain the most widely recognised. They celebrate youth, love, fertility, seasonal transformation, and agricultural prosperity while vividly portraying the natural beauty of Assam.

Folktales

Folktales preserve the imagination and moral philosophy of Assamese society. These narratives feature kings, queens, clever villagers, supernatural beings, animals, birds, and mythical characters. Besides entertaining audiences, they communicate ethical values, social responsibilities, courage, honesty, compassion, and practical wisdom.

Proverbs

Assamese proverbs are concise expressions of collective wisdom acquired through generations of practical experience. They communicate moral lessons, social observations, and philosophical reflections in simple yet powerful language. Even today, proverbs remain

an integral part of everyday communication in rural and urban Assam.

Riddles

Riddles represent an important intellectual tradition within Assamese folk literature. They encourage observation, reasoning, imagination, and linguistic creativity. Traditionally, riddles were exchanged during family gatherings and village evenings, serving both recreational and educational purposes.

Ballads

Ballads narrate heroic exploits, legendary personalities, romantic episodes, and historical events. They preserve local history that is often absent from formal historical records and therefore constitute valuable sources for reconstructing the social memory of communities.

Folk Drama

Assam has developed several distinctive forms of folk theatre that combine storytelling, music, dance, dialogue, and ritual performance. These dramatic traditions communicate religious teachings, historical narratives, and social values while providing collective entertainment.

Commercial adaptation of folk performances for tourism and mass entertainment sometimes alters their original context, meaning, and authenticity. Excessive commercialization may gradually weaken their cultural significance.

Inadequate Documentation

Many valuable folk traditions remain undocumented. As elderly performers, storytellers, and folk artists pass away, numerous oral traditions disappear permanently without being recorded for future generations.

Declining Youth Participation

Modern educational and professional commitments leave little time for young people to learn traditional songs, narratives, and performance practices. Unless deliberate preservation measures are adopted, this generational gap may seriously affect the continuity of Assamese folk literature.

Sustainable Development

The concept of sustainable development extends beyond economic growth and environmental protection; it also includes the preservation and transmission of cultural heritage. In the context of Assamese folk literature, sustainable development refers to safeguarding traditional knowledge and oral expressions while enabling them to remain relevant in contemporary society. Preservation should therefore combine continuity with innovation rather than treating folk traditions as static relics of the past.

Systematic Documentation and Archiving

Comprehensive documentation is the foundation of sustainable preservation. Assamese folk literature should be incorporated into school, college, and university curricula through dedicated courses, practical workshops, storytelling sessions, and research-based learning. The sustainability of folk literature depends primarily on the active participation of local communities. Traditional singers, storytellers, folk artists, and village elders should be recognised as custodians of cultural knowledge.
